BUILDING ON OUR 86 YEAR LEGACY OF SUPPORTING KIDS IN NEED our Executive Director

Eighty-six years ago, Harry E. Burroughs founded Agassiz Village as a place that would truly transform the lives of underprivileged youth. Today, we continue to build on our founder's legacy. In 2021, hundreds of kids experienced a transformative summer at Agassiz Village enjoying our iconic camp activities while at the same time learning the social and emotional skills to better understand themselves and their emotions, see the potential in themselves and set tangible goals to build more positive relationships.

How we increased our support of kids in 2021:

- 1. We partnered with Shout Camp from Today's Innovator to refresh our programming and ensure we are offering the most robust curriculum to support today's youth.
- 2. We added more activities including yoga, fishing, and nutritious cooking.

3. We launched a new year-round Leaders in Training (LIT) program to support teens through high school to become career and college ready.

4. We contracted with Hello Insight to measure the benefits of our Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) program (see our amazing results on page 5).

As we look to the summer of 2022, we plan to increase the numbers of children we served in 2021 by 50%. We know it's imperative that when kids arrive in 2022, staff are prepared. Therefore, we will add a social worker to our summer team, and provide additional training for summer staff in handling difficult behaviors, trauma informed care, and mental health. In addition, we welcome Jaime O'Connor as our new Camp Director. She has over 20 years of experience working at and operating summer camps. We are also excited to introduce Camille Ridge, our new Program Director. Camille started at AV as a camper at age 8 and has been working her way up summer after summer for the last five years.

We know that 2022 won't be without challenges, but with you by our sides, we know we can surmount any obstacle, and ensure that kids have opportunities to have fun, collaborate, explore and thrive. Thank you for your never-ending support.



Kids came back to camp after a very difficult year and a half. School closures, lack of social interaction, possible financial instability at home, fewer health care touch points...it all takes a toll.

That's why kids need camp... kids need AGASSIZ VILLAGE.

All young people need a safe place where they can have fun, be themselves, and most importantly, build meaningful relationships.



Camp is a powerful experience, not only because of the hours of outdoor time kids can bank there, but because it teaches habits that can lead to improved long-term mental health.

We know (both intuitively and through evidence-based studies) that kids thrive when they are taught how to identify and manage their emotions, build healthy relationships, and make great decisions. That's why Agassiz Village incorporates its Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) program into all of our camp activities. These tools help the "whole child" by increasing self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, and responsible decision-making skills.

We partner with Hello Insight to measure our positive SEL outcomes and data shows that our campers:

- (1) Increase their ability to reflect and understand themselves.
- (2) Identify positives about themselves and show personal improvement. And
- (3) Set tangible goals to build more positive relationships.

When 15-year-old Neveah stepped off the bus at Agassiz Village this past summer, it was with a long-held anticipation that she took in her first deep breath of the outdoor Maine air, scanned the crowd of fellow campers and counselors for familiar faces, and joined in the joyful singing of her favorite camp songs. Every year, Neveah looks forward to leaving her worries and difficulties from home behind her on the bus and reuniting with what she calls her second family – her Agassiz family – but this year, the arrival at camp was especially exciting. Last summer was Neveah's first time at Agassiz Village since 2019 due to the pandemic, and she needed it more than ever.

"Running camp this year was really important because, without camp for two years, I don't know what I would've done. I've just been at home, and I think that's been bad for myself...and I know a lot of other kids feel that way too. Getting to come here and be out in nature...it's really good to unplug and let yourself go after everything that's happened."

Neveah was ten years old when she left her Brockton home for the first time in 2016 to attend overnight camp at Agassiz Village for two weeks. She knew from her mom and three older brothers, who also went to camp at AV, that she was headed somewhere special, but now she was going to experience it for herself. Camp quickly became both a place where she could start fresh and leave her problems behind and a community where she found the support and tools she needs to grow and become the best version of herself. Neveah fondly remembers her experience climbing the rock wall at the camp's ropes course, an experience she wouldn't get to have anywhere else. As she climbed, hearing the cheers of support from her friends, she says she felt like she could achieve anything. Neveah says she has learned to take that feeling with her beyond the camp gates, applying herself as best as she can to everything she does.

Staff Heroes: No Cape Needed

Alijah "Flash" O'Connor-Dufresne, Sports Instructor

At the age of 6, I found myself sitting in the back of a police car asking why I couldn't go home and see my mom. In that moment I found my life changing forever. More than anything, in that moment, I wanted to be saved. I wanted a hero to tell me everything would be okay. From that moment, I found myself asking, "What is a hero?"

After two years of moving from foster home to foster home, a kind and loving Vietnamese family took my sister and I in. It was the first time in a long time that I genuinely felt at home. The love and care they gave us made me believe that everything would be all right. I finally thought I understood the answer to that nagging question about heroes.

Then the upheaval began again when my foster parents

moved to Texas, and my sister moved in with her real father, and I was adopted by another family. This time was so difficult, that I struggled to find happiness. For years I found myself living through other people and not really experiencing happiness for myself. The problem with this was at some point I stopped being me and I was just a copy of others.

When I was 16, my new family sent me to Agassiz Village and it was there I found the answer to that old question, "What is a hero?" It was actually quite simple. Heroes are the camp counselors and the staff at Agassiz Village who help kids just like them to be happy even when they are not happy at home. Seeing people have tearful goodbyes at the end of sessions and promises to return the next year made me realize that I wanted to work at AV. I wanted to be a part of the staff, so I could do the same thing these staff members were doing for me for other kids.

This past summer I returned to Agassiz Village as the Sports Instructor. During the day I taught kids of all ages different types of sports and got kids who usually don't like to participate engaged and excited. I was happier than I've ever been. At the end of the summer, I received a lot of notes from the kids telling me how much they loved my classes and they would miss me over the next year. Not going to lie, it made me cry. I'm sure my younger self would be proud of the current me and if you asked me now, "What is a hero?," I would say simply sitting down and talking to someone can make you a hero.

FIVE DECADES SPENT GIVING KIDS OPPORTUNITIES TO SUCCEED

Alumna Theresa O'Bryant has been dedicated to Agassiz Village since she started as a camper in 1975. Nearly five decades later, we are grateful she has stayed involved as Agassiz Village continues to be a huge part of her life. Theresa had been to other summer camps before but at the age of 13 her family was looking for a summer camp where her siblings and cousins could all attend. One of her cousins was physically challenged and at the time Agassiz Village was accessible for all kids. She would head up to Agassiz Village in the summers to have fun and get out of Mattapan. Her parents knew getting out of Boston in the summers would be beneficial for their kids. Theresa went from camper to Counselor-in-Training to Cabin Counselor to Volunteer to Alumni Committee Vice President to Board Member and now most recently Board President.

"I think I worked at Agassiz for nine years over the summers. Those experiences at Agassiz taught me how to be a leader, and it taught me how to take initiative and how to help others and I value that," said O'Bryant.

"I probably would have never gone to college, if it wasn't for Agassiz Village. I wouldn't have known I could have accomplished so much," she said. O'Bryant holds an undergraduate degree in business, a master's degree in business and a law degree. She spent time as a public defender before being appointed as the Dean of Student Success and Engagement at the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, where she works today.

To this day, O'Bryant counts many of her best friends people she met at Agassiz Village and credits the program with helping to make her who she is today.

"At a very young age, they gave us opportunities to lead in a positive way with guidance. You get a chance to try things and test your metal. You don't get that chance in your youth a lot, especially with a safety net and guidance. At Agassiz, you get to see you can do some things," said O'Bryant.

O'Bryant loved having the opportunity to lead a group of kids in song or in an activity where the kids would get a chance to be silly, have fun and do something they can't do at home. "Home is so serious. Home is so stressful. There are not resources, but at Agassiz Village, a kid gets a chance to be a kid whether they are 10 years old or 16 and that means a lot. I was one of those kids and I like having the opportunity to do it for others," said O'Bryant.

When you ask O'Bryant why giving kids the opportunity to attend Agassiz Village is so important she'll say...

"It helps kids to take more risks, try new things and helps inform their world. I think kids deserver an opportunity to see things outside of what's immediately in front of them. A lot of our kids don't get that chance."

Today, you'll find O'Bryant leading Agassiz's Board of Directors, an opportunity she cherishes so she can ensure many more kids get to experience the Village and grow into the adults they were meant to be.






3) FACILITY MASTER PLAN




