87 YEARS of empowering kids to reach their full potential in a safe and nurturing environment

Thank you for being a part of our Village that believes in the power of camp, and its ability to empower kids to become the best versions of themselves.

In 2022, 462 kids enrolled in our summer program were given the opportunity to experience that power. These kids may not otherwise have been able to attend a summer camp due to the high costs of other camp programs. With over \$700k provided in scholarships last year alone, youth had a place to call home for the summer where they could...

- (1) HAVE FUN and enjoy icon camp activities like archery, swimming and fire-building.
- (2) **EXPLORE** new adventures, take healthy risks and try activities they never experienced before like fishing, sleeping on an island, rock wall climbing or yoga.
- (3) **COLLABORATE** and form bonds with counselors who are positive role models and make new friends.
- (4) **THRIVE** in a positive environment learning leadership and social and emotional skills to better understand themselves and their emotions, see the potential in themselves and set tangible goals to build more positive relationships.

Agassiz Village is a place where kids can count on a warm bed each night, food on their plate three times a day, and an adult they can turn to when they need support. It's a place where kids facing extraordinary challenges at home can just be kids – even if it's just for a few weeks. Thank you for giving kids a home away from home where they feel loved and supported and can learn to be their best selves.

We know, through research and the lived experience of our campers, that play, and fun, are natural tools that help youth develop key skills like resilience, relationship-building, positive selfidentity, and emotional regulation and can even set kids up for academic success. We also know that not all kids get equal opportunities for fun and play. Many of the children we serve face extraordinary challenges and stressors in their home lives which is why at Agassiz Village, we intentionally place joy at the core of all our programming. Creating purposeful opportunities for play, joy, and fun is a critical component of our Social Emotional Learning model, but it also allows kids who may face adult worries at home to, well, just be kids.





AV programs are designed to offer youth the opportunity to understand and realize their full potential through investigation, exploration, and adventure as part of our Social & Emotional curriculum. Every summer, hundreds of kids – regardless of their background or home circumstances – attend Agassiz Village for two-four weeks and immerse themselves in nature, try new things and learn different skills, and develop a love for the outdoors.

Our 2022 summer Nature Instructor, Yari, recalls one young first-year camper this summer who, during her first nature activity block announced, "I don't like being outdoors and I don't like bugs." She watched nervously from the doorway of the Nature Cabin as Yari explained to the rest of the group that insects are only scary because they are unfamiliar. Once he showed the girls a spider up close, they became interested and began to catch spiders themselves. By the end of the period, encouraged by watching her cabinmates interacting with the spiders, our timid, insect-wary, first-year camper had joined in, picking up spiders with her bare hands. She and the rest of her cabin spent the remainder of the session collecting different insects from around camp and identifying all the different species they found. **Nature soon became** one of their favorite activity periods, where they spent the two-week session learning about moths, beetles, ants, butterflies and spiders, as well as other outdoor skills like fire and shelter building and navigation. In addition to nature, campers participate in archery, high ropes and challenge courses, swimming, canoeing, fishing, dance, drama, STEAM, and sports.

When we ask campers, staff, and alumni what makes the Village so special, or why they keep coming back, two words always come up the people. Agassiz Village nurtures a supportive community of contributors, built on healthy peerto-peer and peer-to-mentor relationships. We encourage collaboration based on connection and mutual trust and respect, and incorporate this value into daily life at camp is dozens of ways - from team-building activities at our high ropes challenge course to group cabin cleanup time each morning. Our objective is to empower youth through collaboration and relationship-building to empathize with others from diverse backgrounds, work together, and recognize resources and supports.

THRIVE

building strong leaders who achieve their potential

One thing we've learned from welcoming countless returning campers and staff back to AV year after year is that the time a child spends at Agassiz Village is so much more than just a few weeks at summer camp. Watching a child thrive and blossom from a timid first-year camper into a staff member then leave to make their mark on the world has shown us that the skills they develop here, help kids lead meaningful, happy lives as adults.

Ernestine Hallowanger, affectionately nicknamed "Pookie", is one of those individuals who has grown up and grown into herself at the Village. Pookie first arrived at Agassiz at age 15 as a camper. She guickly fell in love with the community, and says that the leadership workshops we offer our teenage campers in addition to traditional activities still benefit her today. Pookie, now a college freshman, participated in our Leaders-in-Training program and served as a staff member for two summers before beginning her first year of college in the fall of 2022. When we asked Pookie why AV is important to her, she said "Agassiz, for me, is a safe haven...it's a way to get away from everything, and I feel important, I feel like I matter." Pookie first joined AV staff in 2021. "To be there to help the kids, I really enjoy it...because I was once that camper who needed this place."







"Kids need Agassiz because Agassiz really shows you that you can be something in this world. It's really difficult nowadays to believe in yourself, but when you come here and you try out all the activities and you see yourself as somebody important and valuable to the world, it really encourages kids to know that they can be something. It gives them a different view on life...I'm a first generation immigrant. My parents didn't finish college, but coming to Agassiz and seeing all of these teachers who are amazing at what they do, it put a lot into perspective. Every kid needs Agassiz."

We hire 72 summer staff ages 17-28. 32% are former campers.

2022 HIGHLIGHTS



Year-Round Leadership Development

Our new year-round Leaders-in-Training program completed its first year! LITs attended career, college readiness, and life/leadership skill workshops throughout the year before stepping into a variety of staff roles at camp during the summer. 100% reported satisfaction, leading us to extend the program from 12 to 24 months.

Responding to the Rise in Youth Social, Emotional, & Mental Health Needs

Young people are increasingly facing mental health challenges. In 2022, AV addressed these concerns with increased social-emotional supports at camp. Volunteers worked tirelessly to renovate our camp library into the Serenity Cabin, which serves as a safe space for campers and staff to unwind, and houses our Social Worker, Social Work Interns, and SEL Coordinator. Social Emotional Learning is also embedded into all camp activities and helps youth process and regulate emotions.





Welcoming International Staff Back to the Village

After a successful first inperson summer after the onset of COVID-19, we were thrilled to bring international staff back to the Village for the first time since 2019. 28 counselors joined us from 15 countries!

In May, we hosted the Ultimate Agassiz Weekend at our campsite in Poland, Maine, which combined our annual Volunteer Weekend, 5K for Kids, and a Facility Master Planning charrette (read more on the next page). We held 3 fundraisers for Agassiz Village in 2022 - the 12th Annual Maine Course, Annual Golf Outing, and 5K for Kids.








Master Plan
